

- It is estimated that about 2,000 different languages are spoken on the African continent.
- The deserts, jungles and plains of Africa are home to some of Earth's most extraordinary animals.
- More than half of the African continent is covered by grassland or savannah.
- Northern Africa is home to the Sahara desert.
- Central Africa has rainforests, high mountains and lakes
- Southern Africa has a small coastal band.
- A Pharaoh was the ruler in ancient times.
- Tutankhamun was a king that ruled Egypt as a pharaoh.
- Cleopatra was the queen if ancient Egypt.
- Hieroglyphics were used to communicate through pictures and symbols instead of letters.




Clothing



Some people in Africa wear traditional African clothing which is brightly coloured with detailed patterns.

Sometimes this is accompanied with beaded bracelets and necklaces. The Maasai Tribe warriors living in the African Savannah, wear lots of red clothing and make masks often carved to look like African animals,





Writing

Hieroglyphs were written by scribes, who had to go to a special school to learn how to write. Almost all scribes were men, although there is some evidence of female doctors being able to read hieroglyphs in medical texts.

Hieroglyphs were used for religious texts and inscriptions on statues and tombs. They were also used for counting crops and animals so that the right taxes could be taken.

The Rosetta Stone, discovered in 1799, was written in hieroglyphs and two other languages, including ancient Greek, which linguists (language experts) could still read.

Linguists translated the hieroglyphs by comparing the languages. It took 20 years to translate all the text into modern language.
